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The Service was faced with
created many new and important issues, ~~for the Service~~ and required unusual precautions ^{were required} in handling both immigration and naturalization problems in the interest of the safety and protection of our country. There was an incentive for dangerous aliens to attempt to gain entrance to this country, either at regular ports of entry or surreptitiously, which required new methods, greater vigilance, and increased personnel at the ports and along the borders. There was a greater need than ever before for careful and thorough investigation of all applicants for citizenship, lest aliens obtain the cloak and protection of naturalization beneath which to carry on activities harmful to this country and our institutions. This important task became more difficult because of the fact that many thousands of aliens recently have sought to become naturalized, now fully aware of the great blessings and privileges of American citizenship.

In addition to the foregoing, the Congress passed the Alien Registration Act of June 28, 1940, requiring for the first time in the history of this Nation, all aliens, regardless of their status, to register, and all aliens over ~~fourteen~~¹⁴ years of age to submit their fingerprints. Within the short period of ~~four~~⁴ months ending December 26, 1940, nearly ~~five~~⁵ million aliens appeared at post offices throughout the country, executed under oath, and filed questionnaires which had been carefully prepared for the purpose of determining the status of the alien in this country, his previous history ^{and} activities, and other pertinent information, and had their fingerprints taken. Notice of this program and the provisions of the statute was brought to the attention of the alien population by various means, including a wide use of the foreign language press and radio, and with the splendid cooperation of

the Post Office Department, the registration was completed without arousing antagonism, resistance, or even serious objection from the aliens themselves. It is too early to make any definite statement as to the number of aliens who failed to register or who gave false answers, but it is estimated that the number is relatively small. ~~and~~ ^{it} is believed that, for the first time since this Nation was founded, an accurate census of the alien population has been obtained. The responsibility for keeping these records up to date, for cataloging them, and processing them so that they may be useful for national defense and for the other purposes of the act, rests, under the terms of the statute, upon this Service. To carry on this important work, the Alien Registration Division, with ~~over a thousand employees~~ ^{and} the latest type of tabulating, sorting, and enumerating machinery, was created. ~~one thousand employees have~~ ^{and} has been working night and day in three shifts to complete the work as rapidly as possible.

Upon this Service also falls the responsibility of ascertaining those aliens who failed to register or who registered falsely, so that it can be decided whether prosecution under the penal provisions of the statute is warranted. For this purpose, ^{with} additional personnel ~~was~~ necessary, and the Special Inspections Division was organized.

In addition, the Nationality Act of 1940 was passed by the Congress which codified and revised the naturalization, citizenship, and expatriation laws, changing in many respects the nationality system of this country which had required ¹⁵⁰ ~~one hundred and fifty~~ years for its development. This of itself created many new duties and responsibilities for this Service to assume.

Moreover, the requests for information and rulings concerning the status of aliens, the determination of citizenship and other similar questions have greatly multiplied due to the national defense program, the Selective Service Act, and other reasons. This necessitated increased personnel and new methods.

Also, during the year, the administrative procedure in appeals from Boards of Special Inquiry at the ports of entry in exclusion cases, and in deportation cases, was revised to make it conform with the highest standards of procedure approved by the courts. The title of the Board of Review was changed to that of the Board of Immigration Appeals, and it was made a larger body with quasi-judicial jurisdiction and, to a degree, independent of this Service. To it was assigned a clerical and examining staff designed to keep the work up to date and avoid the delays which at times had existed in the past.

Deportation was not possible
Because of the inability to deport in many cases, due to the lack of transportation facilities to countries abroad, the dangers of travel through war-infested waters, and the impossibility of obtaining passports from countries engaged in the European strife, it became necessary to acquire facilities for the detention of many aliens whose release on bond pending deportation was not deemed advisable in the best interests of the country. The ordinary detention facilities ^{at} in the various immigration stations were inadequate, being designed for normal times, and it was necessary to select sites and to erect, equip, and staff detention camps thereon. During the year, three such camps were erected at Fort Stanton, New Mexico; Fort Lincoln, Montana, and Fort Lincoln, North Dakota, where approximately ~~eighteen hundred~~ such aliens were detained.

In order to carry out these new responsibilities and duties and to fulfill with greater efficiency the obligations of this Service which had existed heretofore, it was necessary not only to obtain authorization for and to recruit additional personnel, but also to reorganize the Service generally, to create new positions, ^{were created} and to reclassify many old positions, ^{reclassified} both in the Central Office and in the Field.

Congress, in June of 1940, doubled the authorized strength of the Border Patrol; authority was obtained for 200 new Immigrant Inspectors, 150 Naturalization Examiners, 120 guards, and the necessary accompanying clerical force.

Practically all of this increased force was selected during the year, under the rules and regulations of the Civil Service Commission. In addition, 195 Special Inspectors for investigational work in connection with the Alien Registration Act were authorized and many of them recruited.

Many new key positions were created in connection with the reorganization of the Service, designed to coordinate its various functions, supervise more closely the activities of the Field, and provide for more efficient operation of the Central Office. The vacancy in the office of the Commissioner was not filled but the position of Administrative Assistant was created; an Executive Officer was provided for, with an assistant, ^{and} a Budget and Fiscal Officer, and an Instructions Officer under his jurisdiction. The office of Executive Assistant was created and filled, and a General Counsel, with an adequate staff, was appointed to render, among others, the services which had previously been performed by the Solicitor for the Department of Labor. There were also created the positions of Chief Supervisor of Immigration, Chief Supervisor of Border Patrol, Chief Supervisor of Special Inspections,

among others, in the Central Office, as well as many others in the Field.

The total number of employes, permanent and temporary, in this Service at the time of the transfer to the Department of Justice in June of 1940 was approximately 4,000. During the year it was necessary to increase the number to 6,835.

Moreover, many positions, both in the Central Office and in the Field, were reclassified ~~during the year~~ in recognition not only of added responsibilities and new duties, but also of a need which had been recognized for many years but which had heretofore failed of accomplishment. For example, all grade CAF-1 Field positions were reallocated to grade CAF-2, and many other positions were reclassified to make the compensation conform to the responsibilities involved.

In addition, wherever existing law and budget limitations would permit, promotions within the Service were made, and compensation was increased to align it with that of other comparable places in the Government service. This was done, not only to retain in and attract to the Service competent employes against the allurements elsewhere in Federal employment and private industry, but also to reward faithful service, especially in cases where for many years there had been no advance in salary. This policy of promotion and reclassification also was in line with the tradition that this is a career service, which in the past, while recognized, had received but scant practical acceleration.

In all, more than 1,600 advancements were made during the year, by promotion within grade, advancement to higher grades, or reclassification.

The extent of the expansion and reorganization of the Service during the year may be realized by comparing the appropriations for the fiscal year under consideration, \$19,301,520, with those for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1940, \$10,303,100. The increase of \$8,998,420 provided for the additional personnel, ~~for additional~~ equipment, and supplies, ~~for the~~ expansion of detention facilities, and ~~for the~~ reorganization of the Service. A large part of it was required for the heavy expense incurred in connection with the alien registration program. This last item amounted to \$5,900,000, of which \$3,043,855 was transferred to the Post Office Department to reimburse it for the expenses incurred in connection with that part of the registration program which was so ably conducted by that Department.

This Service has at all times attempted to administer fairly and impartially the immigration and ^{OK} naturalization laws prescribed by the Congress. At the same time, the officials of the Service have not lost sight of the fact that our duties involve relations with human beings who are entitled to fair and courteous treatment, and that, in dealing with the foreign born, we should set an example in American citizenship so that the alien may witness in his treatment at our hands the just, fair, and democratic way of administering the laws of this Nation.

While this report, of necessity, must deal to a considerable extent with statistics, it will be the better understood if the human factors which the figures represent are kept in mind. The immense volume of the various activities of this Service, the importance of its responsibilities, and the manner in which its work has been carried on for the fiscal year under consideration will be apparent, it is hoped, from the figures and data which follow.

IMMIGRATION AND EMIGRATION

1. Entries and Departures of Aliens

Volume. Officers of the Immigration and Naturalization Service passed upon 40,424,978 alien and citizen entries into the United States during the fiscal year 1941, of which 38,974,008 were across the land borders. This latter number includes 4,098,470 alien entries and 11,357,962 citizen entries from Canada, and 14,521,163 alien entries and 8,998,413 citizen entries from Mexico. The total alien entries across both borders were 18,617,633, and total citizen entries across both borders were 20,356,375. The entries from Canada decreased in number because of war conditions. These figures compare with 51,822,280 alien and citizen entries in 1940, including 50,102,398 across the land borders. The 1940 entries across the land borders were made up of 13,066,509 alien entries and 13,989,994 citizen entries from Canada, and 15,054,532 alien entries and 7,991,363 citizen entries from Mexico. The officials of the Immigration and Naturalization Service must satisfy themselves that the claim of United States citizenship made by every alleged citizen who is an applicant for entry is valid, and that every alien has the necessary documents and has complied in all other respects with the requirements of law.

Quota immigration to the United States for the fiscal year 1941 was 36,230, as compared with 51,997 in 1940, a decrease of 15,777, or 30.3 percent. The permissible annual quota for the year was 153,774. ~~Stat-~~ 100,000 nonquota immigrants were admitted in the last year, as compared with 138,000 in 1940, a drop of 38,000, or 27.5 percent. Lack of transportation facilities, especially by water, has been partially responsible for

this falling off in number.

Entries into the United States are principally by railroad, bus, automobiles, airplanes, and on foot. There were 39,739 steamships boarded during the year by immigrant inspectors, in addition to 7,906 aircraft.

As compared with a total of 151,784 immigrant and nonimmigrant arrivals during the year just closed, there were 17,115 emigrant and 71,362 nonimmigrant departures, a total of 88,477 departures, making an excess of entries of 63,307.

A detailed report of aliens arriving and departing during the year are shown in Tables I to VI, inclusive, and comparative statistics for the past ⁵ five-year period are shown in Tables VII to IX, inclusive.

It may be of particular interest at this time to know the sources of immigration and the number of immigrants arriving during the country's history. This information, from the records beginning in 1820 to the present, is shown in Table X.

Quota Limitations. The Immigration Quota Law of 1924 and the Quota Proclamation of the President of 1938 set up annual immigration quota limitations for all countries, from which aliens may be admitted to the United States, except those of the Western Hemisphere. Immigration visas under the quotas are controlled entirely by the United States Consular Service of the Department of State under the direction of that Department. Visas are granted only to such aliens as are found otherwise to be admissible, on the basis of the country of birth and not of present citizenship. Certain groups, such as the alien wives and children of United

States citizens, alien husbands married to citizens of the United States before July 1, 1932, professors, and ministers of religion, do not require quota positions.

Immigrant Occupations.—An analysis of the claimed professions, trades, or occupations of immigrants arriving during the fiscal year 1941, shown in Table III, indicates that only 10.2 percent of the immigrants admitted were classified as skilled workers, and 1.5 percent as common laborers, while 53.0 percent (mostly women, children, and old people) claimed no occupations and were therefore noncompetitive. Only ³⁵⁶ 356 immigrants were farmers.

Petitions to import contract labor.—Petitions to the number of 1,511 were filed during the fiscal year 1941 by prospective employers for waiver of the contract labor provisions of the Immigration Act of 1917, as compared with ^{1,562} 1,562 petitions in 1940. Under the statute, skilled labor may be imported if employed labor of like kind cannot be found in the United States. Under the regulations, each case must be investigated to determine the facts upon which administrative action is taken. If a waiver is granted, the conditions concerning the admission of the alien are set forth in the order of the department.

Petitions for immigration visas.—The Immigration Act of 1924 establishes the policy of family reunion by giving non-quota or preferential quota status to certain near relatives of citizens of the United States. The non-quota group includes the wives and unmarried minor children under

21 years of age of citizens of the United States, and the husbands of citizens where the marriage occurred prior to July 1, 1933. Aliens who are the fathers and mothers of citizens of the United States who are 21 years of age or over, or are the husbands of citizens by marriages occurring on or after July 1, 1933, are accorded preference under the quota. The interested citizen in any such case is required to file with the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization a petition for the issuance of a nonquota or a preference quota visa. In 1941, ^{6,945} 6,945 petitions for the issuance of nonquota or preference quota visas were filed with the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, and ^{6,461} 6,461, involving ^{7,225} 7,225 prospective immigrants, were approved. In this way, American citizens secured priority for ^{3,734} 3,734 aliens in the nonquota class and ^{3,486} 3,486 in the preference quota class, including ^{2,377} 2,377 wives, ⁷⁰⁶ 706 unmarried minor children, and ⁶⁵¹ 651 husbands in the nonquota group, and ⁶⁰⁹ 609 fathers, ^{1,012} 1,012 mothers, and ^{1,265} 1,265 husbands as quota preference beneficiaries.

During 1940, ^{11,017} 11,017 such petitions were received and ^{11,002} 11,002 of them, involving ^{12,691} 12,691 prospective immigrants, were approved. The decrease in the 1941 figures was undoubtedly due to a considerable extent to the more extensive investigations which were made in such cases where it was suspected that fraudulent claims of financial ability on the part of the visa petitioners had been made. While these investigations were conducted largely the work of the Field Service and Central Office, which were already overburdened, the satisfactory results justified the extra effort.

Petitions to reapply for admission. Aliens departed from the United States are barred from returning to this country unless, prior to their journey, they receive permission from the Attorney General to reapply for admission. During 1941, there were received ^{1,739} such applications, as compared with ^{2,497} 2,497 in 1940. The law also provides that aliens excluded from admission to the United States are barred for a period of ¹ one year from the date of exclusion from reapplying for admission, unless they have first obtained the permission of the Attorney General to reapply. In 1941, there were ⁷⁵⁵ 755 such applications received, while in 1940 there were ^{1,030} 1,030.

Preexaminations. Resident aliens who had not met the requirements of immigration laws to remain in the United States permanently were, with certain limitations and exceptions, assisted to adjust their immigration status by according them immigration inspection before leaving the United States to secure immigration visas. Applications for such preexamination were received from ^{8,053} 8,053 aliens.

Reentry permits. In 1941, ^{63,587} 63,587 applications for permits to reenter the United States after temporary absence abroad, were received, as compared with but ^{17,215} 17,215 for 1940. During 1941, there were ^{58,953} 58,953 permits granted, while but ^{16,243} 16,243 were issued in 1940. There were ⁴⁸⁴ 484 permits denied in 1941, with ¹⁶¹ 161 in 1940.

3. Exclusions and Deportations

Aliens excluded.—There were ^{2,929} 2,929 aliens excluded from entry. Of these rejections, ^{2,022} 2,022 occurred on the Canadian border, ²⁴⁴ 244 on the Mexican border, ²⁵³ 253 at the port of New York, and ⁴¹⁰ 410 at other ports.

Prevention of White-Slave Traffic.—Under the Paris Agreement of 1904, to which the United States is a party, and the "White Slave Traffic" Act of 1910, the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization is designated as the Central Authority of the United States to receive and circulate information in the prevention of transportation in foreign commerce of alien women and girls for immoral purposes. During the fiscal year 1941, the cases of ²⁴ 24 aliens deported because of prostitution or other immorality were reported to the Central Authorities of the following countries, adherents to the Paris Agreement:

Enforced departures without deportation warrants. Aliens found deportable on other than criminal, immoral, or subversive grounds, or because of mental or physical defects, who are able and willing to leave the country without expense to the Service, are often accorded that privilege. In such cases, the alien's removal from this country is as effectively accomplished as if actual deportation occurred, and he is not prevented from applying immediately for readmission if the basis of his deportable status is technical and does not involve any element of bad moral character which might disqualify him from readmission.

Of the ^{6,531} 6,531 deportable aliens who were allowed to leave the United States at their own expense during the fiscal year 1941, ^{3,450} 3,450 were destined to Mexico; ^{2,453} 2,453 to Canada; ⁹¹ 91 to Europe; ⁵⁰³ 503 to the West Indies; ⁵⁶ 56 to Central and South America; ⁴⁸ 48 to Asia; and ⁴² 42 to other countries.

Suspension of deportation. Action under the Act of June 28, 1940, authorizing the suspension of deportation of certain deportable aliens, was first taken during this fiscal year. The law provides that aliens found deportable on other than criminal, immoral, or subversive grounds or because of mental or physical defects, if of good moral character and deportation would result in serious economic detriment to a resident

spouse, parent or minor child, may have their deportation suspended. In all cases where this action is taken, appropriate report is to be submitted to Congress, and, if a concurrent resolution is not passed by the two Houses during the session that such suspension is not favored, steps may then be taken to cancel deportation proceedings and legalize the entries of such aliens.

A total of 120 cases were reported to the 76th Congress. A number of other cases in which deportation has been ordered suspended will be reported to Congress in the next fiscal year.

~~Aliens deported.~~ During the fiscal year 1941, ^{4,407} 4,407 aliens were deported from the United States under warrants of deportation, while ^{6,531} 6,531 aliens who had been adjudged deportable were allowed to depart at their own expense without a warrant of deportation. The total number of enforced departures thus aggregates ^{10,938} 10,938, as compared with ^{15,548} 15,548 during the previous fiscal year. The principal reasons for the decrease in number of actual deportations from ^{6,954} 6,954 in 1940 to ^{4,407} 4,407 in 1941, are four in number: First, the slackened flow of immigration during the last nine ⁹ years and the great decrease in the number of unaturalized aliens in this country; second, the great care and strictness exercised by American consuls in issuing visas to aliens; third, the use of more effective methods by this Service in preventing illegal entry; and, fourth, the present in-
convenience of obtaining transportation for aliens to depart to many European countries.

706 Ten of the aliens deported in 1941 were under 3 years of age, and 706 under 21. These were largely children belonging to family groups.

Of the remainder, 2,886 were between 21 and 40 years of age, 531 between 41 and 50, and 254 over 50 years of age.

Of the 4,407 aliens deported in 1941, 2,752, or 62.4 percent, were returned to Mexico; 957, or 21.7 percent, to Canada; 251, or 5.7 percent, to Europe; 135, or 3.1 percent, to Asia; and 312, or 7.1 percent, to other countries.

During this last fiscal year, 1,200 criminal aliens were deported. Of these, 699 were returned to Mexico, 345 to Canada, and 62 to Europe.

Deportations not effectual.—A legal finding of deportability and the issuance of a warrant of deportation are entirely ineffectual in cases in which it proves to be impossible to procure a valid passport or other

travel document to gain entry for the alien into some foreign country. In the past, as a general rule, most nations have accepted the return of their own citizens or subjects, even when the latter have been convicted of crimes while abroad. However, there is reason to believe that practically all transatlantic deportations will be prevented during the coming fiscal year because of increasingly unsettled conditions abroad. During the fiscal year 1941, for instance, the Immigration and Naturalization Service has been unable to deport 318 aliens for whom warrants have been issued, because the native countries of these aliens have refused to issue passports for them. This compares with 243 in 1940.

Restraint. Section 23 of the Immigration Act of 1917, as amended by the Act of May 14, 1937 (50 Stat. 164), provides for the removal of indigent aliens to their native lands at Government expense at any time after entry, provided, however, that any person thus removed shall be inadmissible forever for readmission to this country except upon approval of the Secretary of State and the Attorney General.

During the fiscal year 1941, 185 applications for removal were received, as compared with 1,575 in the fiscal year 1940, and 167 applications were granted, as compared with 1,475 in the previous year. Of the 167 applications which were granted, the aliens in 152 cases departed from the United States before the close of the fiscal year. The following tabulation gives the facts in detail:

Filipino repatriations.—Native Filipinos desirous of returning to the Philippine Islands might, upon application to the Attorney General, receive the benefits of the Act of July 10, 1938, as amended, which provided for such return at the expense of the United States Government.

This law expired during the fiscal year, 1941. The total number of such repatriates for the past six years, was 2,190, as 157 left in 1936, 590 in 1937, 582 in 1938, 392 in 1939, 726 in 1940, and 134 in 1941.

3. Special classes

Alien seamen.—The immigration control of alien seamen has been one of the difficult problems of the year. The added requirement of documents has made it necessary to also check outgoing seamen, and the registering and fingerprinting of arriving seamen has been the exclusive work of officers of the Service. Because of the war conditions in Europe, many arriving seamen have refused to reship on vessels bound for waters within the war zone, and it became necessary to limit, by regulation, the stay of seamen seeking to enter in pursuit of their calling to the time of the stay of the vessel on which they arrived, but not exceeding 30 days.

During the year, there were 698,616 inspections of alien seamen, as compared with 938,213 in 1939. This does not represent necessarily that number of separate individuals, as the same seaman may have made several

voyages during the fiscal year, being separately inspected and counted upon each arrival. There were 687,918 departures of alien seamen during 1941.

American seamen arriving at United States ports during 1941 numbered 462,979, as compared with 439,899 such arrivals in 1940.

Chinese. Chinese aliens seeking admission to the United States, as well as those residing in the United States, are required to comply with the provisions of the Chinese exclusion law and the immigration laws. The exclusion law does not permit the entry of laborers but does provide for the admission of teachers, merchants, students, and travelers for curiosity or pleasure. Since the passage of the Immigration Act of 1924, however, Chinese students may be admitted only for the purpose of attending a higher institution of learning formerly approved by the Secretary of Labor and now by the Attorney General. These students are required to terminate their residence upon the conclusion of their studies. Chinese teachers are not admissible unless they fall within the class of professors in universities, colleges, academies, or seminaries. Under this act travelers are classed as temporary visitors and may remain only for the period fixed at the time of admission. The only alien Chinese who are entitled to come to the United States for permanent residence are returning legally domiciled aliens, ministers of recognized religious denominations, and professors, together with their wives and unmarried children under 16 years of age. Under the act of 1924, as

amended in 1923, merchants must be engaged in international trade with the country of their nationality and may remain only so long as they maintain their status. A number of years ago the act was amended to permit the permanent admission of the alien Chinese wives of American citizens whose marriage took place prior to May 26, 1924.

During the fiscal year 1941, there were admitted for permanent residence 171 returning Chinese residents and 66 wives of citizens who fall within the amendatory provision described. Admission was granted to 167 merchants, 251 students, 359 temporary visitors, and 1771 Chinese persons passing in transit through the United States. It thus appears that, as heretofore, the number of alien Chinese coming to the United States to reside either permanently or temporarily is not large.

The main duties of the Immigration and Naturalization Service in determining the admissibility of Chinese occur in connection with the application for admission of those claiming United States citizenship either by birth or relationship as sons or daughters of citizens of the United States. Such cases require extensive examinations and investigations in the effort to determine this fact. During the last fiscal year, 1,436 Chinese claiming citizenship as children of citizens were admitted; 90 applications for admission as citizens were denied. During the same period, 127 Chinese aliens were refused admission for various reasons under the exclusion laws and the immigration laws, and 58 were deported. Chinese claiming citizenship who previously resided in the United States to the number of 1,211 were readmitted.

Nonguota students. There were 1,766 students admitted during the fiscal year 1941, as nonguota immigrants, to attend educational institutions approved by the Attorney General, a decrease of 278 students from the previous year. Such aliens must maintain their student status as long as they remain in the United States. Reports were received on 12,087 such students. Student departures numbered 2,039. Applications for extensions of stay to the number of 3,067 were received.

BOARD OF IMMIGRATION APPEALS

The Board of Review of the Immigration and Naturalization Service was transferred to the Office of the Attorney General and became known as the Board of Immigration Appeals by virtue of General Order C-24 of August 30, 1940. The Board of Review had been a recommending body. It had no power to make a decision in any case.

Under the provisions of Section 37(a) of the Act approved June 29, 1940, the Attorney General vested in the Board of Immigration Appeals authority to render final decisions in all cases involving the disposition of deportation proceedings after the issuance of warrants of arrest, in all cases involving the disposition of appeals from decisions of boards of special inquiry, in either exclusion or preexamination cases, in all cases involving advance application for admission of aliens to the United States under the Seventh or Ninth Provisions to Section 3 of the Immigration Act of 1917, and in all cases involving the disposition of administrative penalties under the immigration laws.

In any case in which a member of the Board dissents from the majority opinion, in any case in which the Board certifies that a question of difficulty is involved, in any case in which the Board orders the suspension of deportation of an alien pursuant to the provisions of Section 19(c) of the Immigration Act of 1917, or in any case in which the Attorney General so directs, the Board must refer the case to the Attorney General for review of its decision. In all other cases the decision of the Board of Immigration Appeals is not subject to administrative review.

Administrative changes within the Board have been made during the past year. The Board of Immigration Appeals now maintains a docket for the orderly disposition of cases pending before it. It hears oral argument on cases which have been timely docketed for that purpose at 2 o'clock daily except Saturday. It will not reconsider a case once a decision has been rendered except upon the basis of a written motion petitioning for such reconsideration supported by reasons justifying the action requested.

The personnel of the Board has been increased from a Chairman and two members to a Chairman and four members. Attached to the Board is an authorized staff of ¹⁸eighteen attorneys for the purpose of studying the records and preparing draft decisions for the consideration of the Board and to aid it in the disposition of the many cases it is required to decide annually. The Board also has a motions examiner who initially reviews motions for rehearing or reconsideration. His findings must receive

the approval of the Board. There has also been added to the staff a docket clerk, who is responsible for the records in all cases pending before the Board of Immigration Appeals.

17,633 During the past fiscal year the Board considered and disposed of 813 17,023 cases and heard oral argument in 813 cases.

III

IMMIGRATION BORDER PATROL

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Activities: During the fiscal year 1941, officers of the Immigration Border Patrol, which is an immigration auxiliary, patrolled 12,207,785 12,207,785 miles, over 4 million 4,000,000 miles more than in 1940; examined 2,001,891 2,001,891 conveyances, and questioned 3,518,353 3,518,353 persons, in their effort to detect and prevent the smuggling and illegal entry of aliens into the United States. They apprehended 12,647 12,647 law violators, 96 96 of whom were smugglers of aliens; 11,294 11,294 illegal entrants; and 4,259 4,259 persons wanted for other law violations. This represents an increase of 1,557 1,557 apprehensions over the previous fiscal year. They seized and delivered to other appropriate law enforcement agencies 174 174 automobiles and trucks and 36 36 other conveyances, or restored them to owners from whom they had been stolen. The estimated value of seizures made was \$73,575. 73,575 These figures also represent a substantial increase.

The average size of the force of officers and employees of all titles on duty during the year was 1,465. 1,465 The transport plan consisted of 314 314 automobiles, 36 36 trucks, 26 26 saddle horses, 15 15 patrol boats, and 11 11 outboard motor craft. (Detailed activities shown in Table I.)

Radio: Additional radio communication stations were added during the year at Houlton, Maine; Miami, Florida; Fort Lincoln, North Dakota; Fort Missoula, Montana; Fort Stanton, New Mexico; San Pedro, California; and Los Angeles, California. Radio transmission power was increased at Derby Line, Vermont; Rouses Point, New York; Buffalo, New York; and Laredo, Texas.

Eighty new automobile transmitters were installed.

Auxiliary work: During the past year, the Border Patrol was called upon to perform considerable non-patrol work for the administrative branch of the Service. Records of this class of work kept since January 1, 1941, indicate that from that date to the close of the fiscal year, patrol officers performed a total of 10,350 man days work, the equivalent of that of 69 patrol inspectors, on non-patrol work, such as inbound and outbound traffic inspection at ports of entry, primary inspection at ports of entry, conveyance of aliens for detention or deportation, guard duty, alien registration, naturalization, and other miscellaneous duties.

Detention camps: As the result of the taking over by the Government last winter of a number of German and Italian vessels in United States harbors, a large number of German and Italian seamen were placed in the custody of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Moreover, because of the difficulties of deportation in many cases due to the war abroad and the lack of transportation facilities, a number of aliens ordered deported were in the custody of the Service awaiting the completion of arrangements to effect their deportation. They overtaxed the detention

facilities at regular immigration stations and it became necessary to establish detention camps. They were placed under the supervision of the Border Patrol, and camps were established at Fort Stanton, New Mexico; Fort Missoula, Montana; and Fort Lincoln, North Dakota. At the close of the year approximately 1,800 aliens were being detained in

these camps. The supervision and administration of these camps, together with the guarding of the detained aliens, has occupied the entire time of approximately 85 patrol officers. Preparations were made to expand the facilities of these camps to accommodate approximately 5,000 persons in the event that it should become necessary.

IV

ALIEN REGISTRATION

Activities.—In June, 1940, the Congress passed the Alien Registration Act. Under its provisions, the United States Department of Justice was directed to register the alien population of the country. For the first time in the history of our nation, a complete inventory was to be made of all non-citizens.

The necessity for the enactment of such a law in the midst of a world upheaval was easily recognized. A measure intended to safeguard the country and to protect all of its people in times of stress needs no defense in order to justify its existence. However, to carry out properly all of the provisions of such a measure, there were required an unusually effective administrative organization, and the cooperation of the aliens themselves.

The Alien Registration Division was created as the agency to administer this program. It is primarily responsible for the registration of aliens living within or entering the boundaries of the States and territories of the United States of America, and for the maintenance of current records relative to these aliens.

4
During the four months of registration, August 27 to December 26, 1940, 4,741,971 aliens were registered in the continental United States, Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands of the United States. The number of aliens residing in each State is shown in Table XIII.

All aliens entering the United States after December 26, 1940, are required to register at the American Consulates abroad at which they obtain their entry visas. Visitors remaining in the United States for a period of 30 days or longer are required to be registered at immigration offices.

Upon receipt of the registration documents by the Alien Registration Division at Washington, D. C., all forms were carefully inspected for completeness and consistency. Each registration then was assigned an identifying number. A registration receipt card was mailed to every registered alien, evidencing his compliance with the provisions of the Act. Fingerprint cards applicable to every registered alien (except minor children under 14 years) were also inspected in the Division for completeness and consistency and, upon the application of identifying registration numbers, were forwarded to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for appropriate classification and filing. All registration forms were micro-filmed in the Division. This was done as a protective measure to insure that copies of the registrations would be available in case of loss or destruction of the originals.

In order to make the important data on the registration forms available for machine processing before placing the forms in normal files,

the information contained concerning each registration was translated into codes and the codes transferred to a series of punch cards. The Division is engaged in completing the punch card files from which alphabetical (Flexoline) and numerical indexes are being prepared. These indexes will make it possible to identify quickly any registered alien either by name or registration number. In addition, the Division is engaged in coding, card punching, and tabulating certain significant characteristics applicable to each alien registrant. When this work is completed (which is expected to be within a few months), the Alien Registration Division will be in a position to show in tabular form information concerning the geographic distribution of the alien population of the country by States, counties, cities, and municipalities, segregated by national groups. Within each of these groups may then be identified the name, ~~and~~ address, age, sex, year of arrival, country of birth, country of citizenship, occupation, literacy, and other data relating to each alien. Information contained in the alien registration records is confidential, and may be released only with the permission of the Attorney General.

It is the purpose of the Alien Registration Division to keep current all pertinent information concerning the alien population of the United States. It will be necessary to register all new arrivals and record such items as changes of address or name, naturalizations, departures and denaturalizations, deaths, and other changes of status for those aliens now naturalized. Thus, at all times, there will be available in the Division an accurate record of the status of each individual alien.

The appreciation of the Service is expressed to the Post Office Department and to the many public and private agencies which cooperated so earnestly in making the task a success.

Special Inspections Division.—A division of specially trained investigators, known as the Special Inspections Division, was organized for the primary purpose of making inquiries into fraudulent registrations and failures to register under the Registration Act. Investigations of special cases presenting difficulty and those widespread in scope extending into other districts, are also handled by this division.

V

NATURALIZATION

Certificates of arrival and preliminary applications for naturalization.—Preliminary applications to obtain certificates of arrival and to file declarations of intention were received during 1941 from ^{323,985} 323,985 aliens, in comparison with ^{237,599} 237,599 received in 1940. There were also received, in 1941, preliminary applications for certificates of arrival and for petitions for naturalization from ^{455,373} 455,373 aliens, as compared with ^{312,840} 312,840 in 1940. These figures for the two ^{types} kinds of applications are over four times larger than those of ⁷ seven years ago, as the fiscal year 1933 showed ^{87,921} 87,921 preliminary applications for declarations of intention, and ^{105,469} 105,469 for petitions for naturalization. There were thus a total of ^{779,358} 779,358 pre-

liminary applications, and in 1941 an increase of ^{555,114} 555,114, or 145.5 percent, over the 323,985 of 1940. In 1941, there were ^{457,216} 457,216 certificates of arrival

issued as a basis for filing declarations of intention or petitions for naturalization, while but ^{312,195} 312,195 of such certificates were issued in the preceding year.

Naturalization examiners at hearings. Naturalization examiners, in the course of their administrative hearings, examined or reexamined 330,312 ^{16,886} 330,312 petitioners in person, and 18,850 by correspondence, as compared with 301,789 and 15,133, respectively, in 1940. They also questioned 572,248 witnesses in person, as compared with 568,919 last year; and 27,114 by correspondence, as compared with 30,371 in 1940. The examiners attended 5,367 court hearings this past year, as compared with 4,573 in the preceding year. The naturalization courts canceled 1,055 certificates of naturalization for various causes, compared with 1,011 in 1940.

Naturalization declarations, petitions, and admissions. Declarations of intention were filed in naturalization courts by 234,123 ^{234,123} 234,123 aliens, of whom 129,683 ^{94,440} 129,683 were males and 94,440 were females, as compared to 202,338 in 1940. During 1941, 277,207 ^{132,993} 277,207 aliens—132,993 males and 144,214 females—filed petitions for naturalization, as compared with 273,039 ^{144,814} 273,039 petitions filed in 1940. The courts admitted 277,294 ^{277,294} 277,294 aliens to citizenship during the fiscal year 1941, an increase of 42,034 ^{42,034} 42,034 over the fiscal year 1940. In 1941, the courts denied 7,829 ^{7,829} 7,829 petitions for naturalization.

Detailed statistics on the applications for naturalization papers received, declarations of intention and petitions filed, petitions denied, and admissions made, during the years ended March 31, 1941, and 1940, are shown in Table 217.

Countries of former allegiance of persons naturalized.—The principal nations to which aliens admitted to citizenship during the years 1938 to 1940, inclusive, renounced allegiance are shown in Table ^{XV} IV. These data for the fiscal year 1941 are not yet available.

Naturalization certifications.—The Central Office issued, in 1941, 13,921 duplicate naturalization certificates, as compared with 11,738 in 1940, and 3,493 new declarations of intention, as compared with 3,440 in 1940, to replace originals that had been lost, mutilated, or destroyed. During 1941, 3,102 certificates of derivative citizenship were also issued, as compared with 4,050 in 1940. Also during the year, 35,187 other documents of various kinds were issued.

Registry of aliens.—By the Act of March 2, 1929, as amended August 7, 1939, 1939, an alien of good moral character not ineligible to citizenship and not subject to deportation, who entered the United States prior to July 1, 1924, and who had resided in the United States continuously since, in whose case there was no record of admission for permanent residence, might apply to the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization to make a registry of his arrival for immigration and naturalization purposes. Upon proof of the required facts, the registry was made and such alien was deemed to have been lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence as of the date of his entry.

This law was repealed by the Nationality Act of 1940 and the same provisions were incorporated therein and went into effect on January 13, 1941.

During the fiscal year 1941, ^{35,925} 35,925 applications for registry were received, as compared with ^{31,565} 31,565 in 1940, and ^{23,427} 23,427 finally disposed of in 1941 by the Central Office after investigation by the naturalization examiners. Of these latter, ^{31,659} 31,659 were granted, ^{1,535} 1,535 were denied, and ¹⁶³ 163 withdrawn.

VI

REGISTRATION FOR CITIZENSHIP

The work of the Education Division has reflected the trend of the Nation toward a keener awareness of the importance, responsibility, and privilege of citizenship of the United States. This year, greater interest has been evidenced in better citizenship and in proper preparation for it.

This trend has been the result of various factors—world conditions which make citizenship status and its clarification a primary necessity; alien registration, disclosing alien status of many individuals who thought they were citizens, and a general manifestation of loyalty at the first threat of danger, to name a few.

While the Service had a statutory right to provide facilities in this field in previous years, its duty was reaffirmed and extended by the Nationality Act of 1940, and its responsibility was more specifically set forth in the regulations effective January 15, 1941.

The Nationality Act of 1940 authorizes the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization to promote instruction and training in citizenship responsibilities of applicants. This authority includes the holding of

names of candidates for naturalization to the public schools, preparing and distributing citizenship textbooks to those candidates for naturalization who are receiving instruction within or under the supervision of the public schools, preparing and distributing a monthly immigration and naturalization bulletin, and obtaining the aid of and cooperating with official State and national organizations.

National Citizenship Education Program. On the last day of the fiscal year 1941, the President approved a National Citizenship Education Program which is a logical sequence of the registration of nearly five million non-citizen foreign born of this country. Its object is to provide facilities so that approximately a million of them (during the coming year) may attend classes conducted by about ten thousand teachers in preparation for the duties and responsibilities of citizenship.

Through a Work Projects Administration project sponsored by the Immigration and Naturalization Service, with the sanction of the Attorney General, the opportunity will be offered to each State Superintendent of Public Instruction to sponsor a State program through cooperation with the Y. W. C. A. and the other agencies of the community which are interested in building a stronger America. A distinguished educator is to serve as National Director, assisted by a National Advisory Board to consist of two officials of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, two from the Y. W. C. A., and a fifth to be chosen by those four.

A State Advisory Council is to be set up in each State having a citizenship education program, to be made up of representatives of groups and interests whose counsel will be valuable in conducting a program of this type and scope. Governmental agencies have a special responsibility in overcoming national, social, and other barriers and in presenting to the registrants under the Alien Registration Act of 1940, the opportunity to learn more of the fundamental principles of the Constitution and Government of the United States.

Federal Textbook on Citizenship.—The Federal Textbook on Citizenship, "Our Constitution and Government," which is authorized by statute, was placed in the field, where it was used by applicants for naturalization. There were ^{69,529} 69,529 copies of the book distributed to ⁵⁹⁸ 598 different communities throughout the United States. Because the language level of the text was beyond the ability of many beginning adult students, a simplified edition was undertaken during this fiscal year by Doctor John G. Harvey, Dean and Professor of Constitutional Law of the School of Law of Temple University. The first manuscript was completed during the latter part of the year, and mimeographed copies of the simplified version were sent to educators and others interested in the field of adult education for the purpose of evaluation. The manuscript will be revised in the light of suggestions received and will go into print during the coming fiscal year.

Alien Alienship Ceremonies.—The Immigration and Naturalization Service aided in organizing more than 500 ceremonies on a nationwide scale commemorating

the coming into citizenship of the United States of those foreign-born persons who became naturalized during the preceding year. This was the second year in which these ceremonies were held in accordance with the Joint Resolution of the Congress of May 3, 1940. This measure provided for such ceremonies, for enlisting the cooperation of the judiciary, and for cooperation with civil and educational authorities, and patriotic organizations in a continuous effort to dignify and emphasize the significance of citizenship.

VII

NEW LEGISLATION

More important legislation affecting the restriction and control of aliens became effective or was passed during the fiscal year than in any other period of this country's history. These laws, requiring stricter control or changed procedures, have greatly enlarged the detail and supervisory work of the Service.

The Alien Registration Act of June 28, 1940, provided for the registration of all aliens in the United States, and for those who enter the United States and remain for a period of 30 days or longer. The registration of these aliens began on August 27, 1940, the details of which are discussed under Section IV, Alien Registration, of this report. Other pertinent provisions of the Act were (1) requirements that aliens seeking to enter the United States present in their native lands, or other countries, or

border-crossing identification cards, (2) authorization for the Attorney General to permit certain aliens to depart from the United States in lieu of deportation and to suspend deportation of certain classes of aliens if deportation would result in serious economic detriment to certain resident relatives, and (3) enlargement of the causes for deportation of criminal aliens and those guilty of subversive activities or holding subversive beliefs.

The Act of July 1, 1940, required aliens admitted into the United States as officials of foreign governments either to maintain their status or to depart from the United States, with the approval of the Secretary of State.

The Act of July 2, 1940, provided that native-born women, who have heretofore lost their citizenship by marriage to aliens, were restored to citizenship if they had resided continuously in the United States since the date of marriage.

Another Act of July 2, 1940, related to the naturalization of certain aliens who entered the United States under 16 years of age, and who filed petitions to become citizens within one year after reaching their ^{21st} twenty-first birthday. This Act, however, has been regarded as being in conflict with the Nationality Act which became effective January 13, 1941.

Two bills of a fiscal nature were enacted into law, that of August 22, 1940, providing for the deposit of certain collections for overtime service to the credit of the appropriation for the payment of such compensation, and that of October 10, 1940, providing better facilities for the enforcement

of customs and immigration laws relating to ports, as well as the erection of fences and gates at the international boundaries.

The Nationality Act of 1940, which was approved on October 14, 1940, was the most important naturalization legislation since the passage of the Basic Naturalization Act of June 29, 1906. This Act was a codification of the nationality and naturalization laws of the United States, and repealed generally all previous laws of this nature. However, the saving clause provided that any nationality status acquired under previous laws ^{will} shall not be lost. The Act went into effect on January 12, 1941, and necessitated the rewriting of all of the naturalization and nationality regulations, and the revising of forms used in naturalization proceedings.

The Act of June 20, 1941, ²⁰ authorized the refusing of visas to aliens whose admission to the United States would endanger public safety.

The Act of June 21, 1941, extended the provisions of the Act of May 22, 1918, providing that during the existence of the present national emergency which was proclaimed by the President on May 22, 1941, or when the United States is at war, the President may, by proclamation, restrict the entry and departure of persons from the United States.

VIII

IMPROVEMENTS IN ADMINISTRATION

During the past year, improvements in administration have taken place in the Immigration and Naturalization Service. In the first place, having

newly became a component of the Department of Justice following the transfer of the Service from the Department of Labor, measures have been taken to integrate the Service with the departmental organization to the extent that that has appeared practicable and economical, and to coordinate closely the efforts of the Service with other agencies of the Department and of the Government, generally.

The international situation, new legislation, and the progress of national defense ^{have} shifted the burden of work in some respects and heavily increased it in others. To meet this situation, certain organizational improvements have been made. The large increase in field personnel has prompted the establishment in Washington of an improved system of administering the Field Service. An Assistant has been furnished the Deputy Commissioner in charge of the Field Service; a Chief Supervisor of Immigration has been established; a Chief Supervisor of Special Inspections, having charge of investigations in connection with violations of the Alien Registration Act of 1940, has been appointed; and an Assistant to the Chief Supervisor of Naturalization has been created.

In the Central Office, there has been established the office of General Counsel to act as first-hand adviser to the Service. Administrative functions, which have of necessity correspondingly increased with the growth of the Service and the increase of its work, have been organized along new lines under an Executive Officer and include, besides an Assistant Executive Officer, a Budget and Fiscal Control Officer, and an Instructions Officer.

The Board of Immigration Appeals, formerly known as the Board of Review, has been expanded to five members, and the Examining Division of the Board also has been enlarged to cope with the volume of work made necessary through an enactment of new statutes and the institution of new procedures required through the implication of certain court decisions.

It was quite apparent by the end of the fiscal year of 1941 that these improvements had resulted already in more effective administration.

IX

PERSONNEL OF THE SERVICE

On June 30, 1941, the total personnel of the Immigration and Naturalization Service was 6,885. The Central Office in Washington consisted of a force of 14 executive and staff officers, a legal and administrative staff of 1,571 employees, of whom 108 permanent employees and 469 temporary employees were engaged in the Alien Registration Division and 29 employees were engaged with the Special Inspections Division, having to do with alien registration. The Field Service consisted of 74 executive and supervisory officers (including 6 supervisors of special inspections), 1,455 inspectional and investigative employees (including 131 special inspectors), 318 naturalization examiners, 1,367 clerks, 49 interpreters, and a custodial force of 521 employees; a border patrol force consisting of 29 supervisory officers, 1,207 patrol inspectors, 157 radio, mechanical, and other employees, and 53 employees assigned to duty at alien detention camps.

Courses of instruction have been provided for new personnel in the Border Patrol and Special Inspections Division in keeping with the in-service educational program.

It has been possible during the year to recognize merit and ability among the employees through increases in compensation and assignment to duties of higher responsibility. With recognition that this is a career service, the morale has been greatly improved by this program and an incentive furnished to all members of the organization to prepare themselves for positions in the higher brackets.

More than 1,000 advancements were made from within the Service to fill positions in higher grades through reclassifications and promotions in the Central Office and in the Field. The principal groups affected were as follows:

In addition, 173 Immigrant Inspectors were promoted from grade 3 ^{at} \$2,500 to grade 4 ^{at} \$2,700, 12 Immigrant Inspectors were promoted from grade 4 ^{at} \$2,700 to grade 5 ^{at} \$3,000, 61 ^{there were} within-grade promotions were made in the Central Office, and 432 ~~within-grade promotions were~~ made in the Field.

Thus all promotions made, including advancements to fill positions in higher grades, reclassifications, and within-grade salary increases, totaled approximately 1,678.

NOTE.—Because the revenues produced by the various branches of the Immigration and Naturalization Service are covered into the United States Treasury and in no way used as offsets against the operating cost of the Service, citizens often forget that immigration and naturalization are partly self-supporting functions of government and that increasing activity and expense bring with them increased revenues. For this reason, the following figures of receipts of the Service are interesting:
